


## ON THE WAY HOME LOGIC MODEL



### Program Overview

On the Way Home (OTWH) is an aftercare intervention designed to prevent reentry to out of home care for youth who have received services in residential programs. OTWH is based on Social Learning Theory (Bandura, 1977) and promotes placement stability through family empowerment and caregiver self-efficacy to improve parenting and family functioning so the behavioral and academic skills the youth gained while in residential care are sustained. OTWH is made up of three components (i.e., Family Support, School Support, and Homework Support) that are an integration of defined school and family-centered interventions, which include Common Sense Parenting® (Burke et al., 2015), a modified version of Check & Connect® (Christenson et al., 1997; Christenson et al., 2008), and Homework Support (Trout et al., 2012). Short-term outcomes include: establishing transition plans, increasing positive parenting practices, maintaining positive youth behavior and academic success factors such as attendance and grades, increasing student involvement in extracurricular activities, increasing school-family partnerships, and reducing homework frustration. Primary long-term outcomes are home and school placement stability to prevent reentry to out of home placement and increase the likelihood of high school graduation.
